The Baptist Home Philosophy

Introduction

This is the third and final in a series of articles on The Baptist Home Philosophy. It came from a presentation made at one of our staff development conferences.

To review what we have covered earlier, there are five (5) Principles. However, they are **not** to be seen as **separate** in themselves but are all intricately connected to each other. They are the following:

Individual: each resident is a unique individual who comes with a lifetime of experiences that make him or her who he or she is today.

Autonomy/Decision Making: The right of self-determination, as long as it does not endanger the resident or other residents, is vital to the emotional well being of the resident.

Feelings/Emotions: Life is filled with emotional experiences. Some are very good experiences. Some are not so good. The greatest pain in old age (and in any age for that matter) is emotional pain.

Listen: To effectively minister to others, we must be good at listening rather than talking!

The last of the five is **Relationship** which is the topic for this article.

V. Relationship

Earlier in this presentation, I said that the degree to which you are willing to **listen** is the degree to which you will **successfully relate** to the residents (or to any other person for that matter). Let me also add this:

The degree to which you build **meaningful relationships** is the degree to which you will help residents **cope successfully** with the issues of life.

No matter how well we may apply all of the other Prin-

ciples of this Philosophy, they work effectively only when applied in relationship. *In my opinion*, helping others cope successfully with the issues of life requires more than just good "technique". It requires a genuine, caring relationship with those persons (especially elderly persons) we are trying to help.

(b) When the steady stream of friends came at the death of my parents, it was not what they said or what they did that made the difference. It was the fact that they were there! It was the warm, caring fellowship of friends, more than anything else, that helped us cope.

That fact has not changed. Although considerable time has passed, it is still those relationships with caring friends and family that help us with our grief.

(c) I would guess that everyone who reads this article has had similar experiences. I would also guess that as you look back, one person stands out more than any other who helped you through that experience. And, it is not always the "professional" person who helps most... although I have the highest regards for all of them, such as one's minister who always has a significant role in helping us deal with our emotional pains. I would guess the one who helped most was a caring friend or family member who stood by you, who gave you comfort, on whom you could lean, and who "walked with you" through your hurt.

Emotional healing takes place in relationship. Coping successfully with the stresses of life *requires friend-ships*.

(d) In a sermon recently, I talked about the events immediately following the crucifixion of Jesus. When we first hear about His followers, they were meeting behind locked doors. They were frightened. They thought they would be next.

The early Believers came together for one reason:

they needed each other. It is true that when they met they read the Scripture and prayed. But, the primary reason they kept coming back together was because they needed each other.

Coping successfully with the issues of life takes the emotional support of friends. For many residents of The Baptist Home, we are their nearest contact as they deal with the issues of life. (For some, we are their only contact.) No matter how well you and I apply the Principles of this Philosophy, they are genuinely effective only when applied in the context of a caring relationship with the resident.

B. Now, I want to say here that something of the opposite is also true. The very best relationship is not as effective *without* the application of the other Principles. "Relationship" alone is not enough *no matter how caring our friends may be.* I have seen folks who have had the best of intentions but have said some of the most "gosh awful" things to the friends they were trying to comfort. I have known some very successful pastors who are loving and caring and well meaning, but who have said things to their congregation that slowed the emotional healing process rather than helping it.

To help people cope successfully with the issues of life requires **both** the effective application of good principles or "techniques" **and** a warm and caring relationship with the persons to whom you are ministering. I have often seen at The Baptist Home significant "breakthroughs" with residents that came after years of work by a skilled "technician" who applied his or her skills in an atmosphere of love and concern and support.

- **C.** It needs also to be said that when people hurt, **there is no easy "fix".** Healing takes time and patience and the nurture of an understanding person. Our culture is always searching for the "short-cut". Hoping to rely on medications and prescription drugs (or other drugs) is common. Remember, while medications for emotional pain may bring temporary relief, they have their limits. When the medication wears off, the **cause** of the emotional pain is still there and still has to be addressed.
- 2. We talk a lot in our work about moving from the "medical" model to the "psycho-social" model. The Baptist Home is not a "medical center" but is a "living center" where we focus on the emotional issues of aging, which I have said many times are the most difficult issues not just of growing old, but of all of life.

You will also hear talk in the long term care industry about more flexible schedules for the residents so not everyone has to come to the Dining Room at the same time, for example, but has more freedom to make choices. Facilities are being designed as "neighborhoods" rather than "hallways and corridors".

All of these changes help to make living in long term care more "home-like" and less "institutional". At The Baptist Home, however, I want us to go one step further. Ours is a "Relationship" model. People find help dealing with the issues of life and help to become something better than they are now because of their relationship with caring, understanding persons who are also good at what they do.

I would call it the "Spiritual" model, but "Spiritual" is so often misunderstood. "Spiritual Model" means to some that we do all the right things. We have Chapel Services and Bible Study Groups. We have Missionary Groups and Prayer Services. We have Chaplains who serve something in the role of "in-house" pastors for our residents. We say Grace at mealtime.

But... you can do all of those things and still follow none of the five Principles of TBH Philosophy that are essential if we are to have an effective ministry.

I am hesitant to call it the "Spiritual" model because it could be misunderstood. Ours is a Relationship model. And, I don't know anyone, anywhere who does it better.

3. If I were to add a sixth Principle to The Baptist Home Philosophy, it would have five (5) points. I would call it "Five Universal Truths". Some things in life are "absolutes" in the sense that everybody experiences them.

Fact Number One: We are *all* aging. Everybody is growing older. Some of us may have a head start on others, but we are all aging at the same rate. This means . . . among other things . . . that those unique individual characteristics or life patterns that we have developed over a lifetime are becoming more "set" or "fixed" in our personality and will continue to become more obvious as we age.

It also means that one day we will not be the Caregiver. We will be the "patient". You and I will be on the *receiving* end of this Philosophy.

Fact Number Two: Everybody hurts! I don't care who you are or where you are, everybody hurts . . . either because of a loss or losses in our lives or because of significant disappointments or because we feel someone has done us wrong or whatever. Some are hurting because of issues at home. Some are hurting because of issues in the neighborhood . . . some because of issues at work . . . or issues at church . . . or maybe all of the above.

All of these create emotional pain.

(I doubt if anyone . . . in the time it takes to read this article . . . can go that long without some significant problem you face flashing through your mind!)

Everybody hurts.

Fact Number Three: Everybody wants to be heard. Everybody wants to feel that someone cares. We all need a trusted friend who will listen and who, when we pour out our souls, will continue to love us in spite of what new thing they may learn about us.

Fact Number Four: Most are unable to express their feelings verbally or in other positive, constructive, healthy ways, either because . . .

. . . they don't understand why they feel the way they feel, or

. . . because they are afraid to say how they really feel, afraid their friends (and maybe even God) won't

understand, or . . . because they have always been told that you keep your feelings to yourself. "Learn to live with it!"

Fact Number Five: Since everybody hurts and since most are unable to express their feelings in positive, constructive, healthy ways, the greatest ministry you and I can provide for our residents is to help them to be able to express (in one way or another . . . in "healthy" ways. . .) how they feel. This often means helping them to put their feelings into words. Sometimes it may mean saying the words for them. Sometimes it means helping them when they really don't know why they are feeling the way they are feeling.

B. We use the word "Validation" which is usually thought to take place in one-on-one situations where the person and his or her feelings are accepted or "validated". But, there are many ways and many opportunities to validate and to help residents deal with their emotions.

I don't want our Chaplains to think I am speaking only to them, but Chapel Worship Services provide an excellent opportunity to help residents deal with the emotional issues of life. In the sermon and in other parts of the Worship Service, we can say for our residents what they may be unable to say for themselves. There are universal feelings . . . such as grief, loneliness, disappointment . . .that can be addressed when the Bible is applied to everyday life. So often, however, we try to teach Bible facts rather than applying Biblical truths.

For example, when you think of the story of Zacchaeus, typically what comes to mind is the story of a short man who made his friends and neighbors mad by collecting taxes from them and who so wanted to see Jesus that he climbed a tree where he could see over the crowd. And, while that is true, not many people in the congregation will be able to identify with that.

But, Zacchaeus was a man who had an unfulfilled life. When he reached his goals, he discovered that they were not as attractive as he thought they would be. Life hadn't gone the way he thought it would go!

Now . . . the story of Zacchaeus has more universal issues that apply to many of us. Most of all, Zacchaeus was a man who found forgiveness regardless of how bad his sin may have been. That begins to touch on the feelings and the needs of all of us.

Music is another excellent way to touch on some of the universal feelings and emotions. Old familiar hymns deal more with human feelings than they do with theology.

Trials dark on every hand, and we cannot understand, All the ways that God would lead us to that blessed Promised Land.

Oft our cherished plans have failed, disappointments have prevailed.

Is there anyone who cannot identify to some degree with those words? That is an example of how music helps us by expressing feelings and emotions that we otherwise have difficulty expressing for ourselves.

You can sometime say things in music that you cannot say otherwise!

Explain this to me:

If you try to tell a friend about your disappointments in life and how it hurts when you had such high hopes that did not come to pass, he or she may say something like, "Well, you've just got to get over it!"

But, that same person will stand beside you in church and sing the above referenced hymn with you over and over again!

Music is an excellent way of helping to release those feelings that we may not be able to express otherwise.

And, *most of all, prayer* is a great opportunity to help others (and ourselves) to deal with painful, emotional issues.

Most of our praying is asking God to "fix it". "Make it better." "Take it away." But, along with that, isn't it all right to say in our prayer words like, "Sometimes I feel so discouraged." Or, "Sometimes it hurts so much . . ."

When I am praying with another person, in addition to asking God to "fix it" or make it better, I always try to put into words what I believe he or she is *feeling* . . . pain . . . hopelessness . . . disappointment.

There are many ways, if we look for them, that we can help others express feelings that they may not be able to express for themselves. And, when you do, I believe you have provided for them a most valuable ministry.

Closing

Even if you practice effectively all Five Principles of this Philosophy and even if you acknowledge all five of the Universal Facts, that is no guarantee that your troubles or anyone else's will all be over. But, I can almost guarantee you that these Principles will help you cope . . . and that's really what life is all about.

It has been a real privilege to communicate with you through these articles.

March 2006 the Baptist Home's Senior Adult Ministries (SAM) program will be co-sponsoring a special two-day event for senior adults. The event is the Spring Senior Adult Celebration, March 20 – 21 at the First Baptist Church of Jefferson City.

This event is a blending of two very successful senior adult events. For many years The Baptist Home sponsored a Senior Adult Retreat at Windermere each May. For the last three years First Baptist Church has sponsored a special three-day spring event for the seniors in the Jefferson City area in March. For some time The Baptist Home SAM Leadership has been interested in developing regional two-day inspirational/educational senior adult events to supplement and expand their retreat programs.

Over the last several months we have been working together to blend these two old events into a new event for Missouri seniors adults.

The Spring Senior Adult Celebration will include four worship services led by Dr. Phil Briggs and Rosemary Hoover. Phil and Rosemary are well known by Missouri senior adults because of their numerous revivals, concerts and retreats in our state. Many will remember they were our worship leaders at the 2002 Spring Senior Adult Retreat. Phil's dynamic and insightful preaching is always an inspiration. Rosemary's multiple musical talents are awesome. There is a special blessing when these two combined their voices in musical duets. Under their leadership the Celebration's worship services will be awesome and inspirational.

The Spring Senior Adult Celebration will also include twelve to eighteen enrichment conferences. These conferences will be similar to the type of sessions offered at the State Senior Adult Retreats. Members of the state Senior Adult Ministry Team and other individuals will lead these educational times.










- ➤ A future new entrance and nurse's station on the Goodwin Wing.

Dear Friends,

After twenty-one (21) years at The Baptist Home, Jane and I will be retiring at the end of this year. I want to say again what many of you have heard me say many times before: It has been an absolute privilege to be a part of this great ministry.

One of my special privileges has been the opportunity to meet so many of you. You have welcomed me into your homes and we have developed wonderful relationships.

It is also a special privilege to personally know two (2) of the four (4) former Superintendents of The Baptist Home. John Burney and Ed Goodwin both live in this area and we see each other occasionally.

As a young lad, when I visited The Baptist Home with my parents, I saw Dr. Scott. He would never have known me, but his impressive stature made a lasting impression on me. And, then I have the privilege of knowing as a personal friend Mr. Bill Riggs, grandson of the founders, Dr. and Mrs. Milford Riggs, and of meeting Scott Russell, Rex Russell, and Lynn Brendlen, all grandchildren of Dr. and Mrs. Scott.

Another special privilege is that for the past three (3) years we have had our offices in the original building of The Baptist Home, named the "Riggs/Scott Building" in honor of Dr. and Mrs. Riggs and Dr. and Mrs. Scott. Completed in 1923, it is a classic structure and the fulfillment of an architectural dream. In Dr. Riggs words, it is " . . . an architectural expression of love." Having our offices in this building has put me in daily contact with the residents.

One of the things I hoped we would accomplish before my retirement is to complete the upgrading of the entire Ironton Campus including this building. Renovations are under way, but it is a slow process that will not be completed by the end of the year. Updating the Ironton Campus has been a part of the Strategic Plan of The Baptist Home Board of Trustees since 1999, but other issues have kept us from completing the project.

Projects currently under way are:
